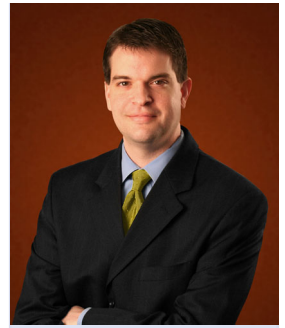

The Tocqueville Society was created to honor people who serve their community at extraordinary levels and give immensely of their time, talent, and resources. Members in the Society include individuals and private foundations meeting the leadership giving standard of \$10,000 or more annually. Consisting of 79 members and chaired by Dr. and Mrs. Arthur W. Sherwood, the Tocqueville Society contributed over \$1 million to the annual campaign.



## *Dorothy Darling Society*

Dorothy Darling has continued her family's legacy of generosity to support children and family programs throughout the Wyoming Valley. Although Dorothy no longer lives in the area, she continues to make significant contributions and carry on the tradition of giving back to the community that has been so important to her family. Established in 2004, this Society recognizes donors who contribute between \$5,000 and \$9,999 annually.

### **Pre-Kindergarten Tax Credits:**

A business may receive a tax credit equal to 100% of the first \$10,000 contributed to a Pre-K Scholarship Organization during the taxable year, and may receive a tax credit equal to 90% of any additional amount contributed during the taxable year, up to a maximum of \$100,000 per taxable year.

### **Scholarship Organization Tax Credits:**

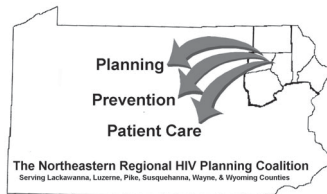
A business may receive a tax credit equal to 75% of its contribution to a Scholarship Organization that is included on the current list published by the Department, up to a maximum of \$200,000 per taxable year. The tax credit may be increased to 90% of the contribution made, up to a maximum of \$200,000 per taxable year, if the business agrees to provide the same amount of contribution to an organization for two consecutive years.

# partnership matters.



Once again, the **United Way** partnered with Luzerne County to help develop the *Integrated Children’s Service Plan* which will help to integrate services for families served by multi-systems. Through partnership with Luzerne County, we also began and co-chair “No Wrong Door”, a model for systems and practice change. This model is looking at ways to integrate services for families who are served by multi-systems.

**Success By 6®** has been striving to engage the community about the importance of early education. This initiative continues to focus on promoting and improving school readiness, quality childcare, inclusion of children with special needs, and public engagement.



**Northeast Regional HIV Planning Coalition** - United Way of Wyoming Valley completed its 19<sup>th</sup> year as Fiscal Agent for the PA Department of Health grant to provide HIV-related services in Luzerne, Lackawanna, Pike, Susquehanna, Wayne and Wyoming Counties. This past year, the United Way and its 5 subgrantee agencies provided over \$950,000 in regional planning, case management, prevention services, support services, and housing services to persons living with or affected by HIV/AIDS. Through this initiative, United Way of Wyoming Valley is able to provide a high quality continuum of care to these individuals.

Over **73,000** people received the benefits of community support services, including disaster relief, and information and referral service through United Way funding

**Day of Caring** - For the 19th consecutive year, this community-wide event brought together a record number of more than 900 volunteers, representing local companies, local organizations, schools and community individuals who worked on one of more than 70 service projects at non-profit organizations throughout Luzerne County. More than 40 non-profits benefited from this one-day initiative. A kick-off breakfast was sponsored by Wegmans Food and Pharmacy in their cafe for all volunteers.



**Christmas in July Food Drive** -16 organizations collected over 47,00 pounds of food for the emergency food bank at Commission on Economic Opportunity.



**Jeans for Jumpstart** - Jumpstart is an early childhood program at Luzerne County Head Start. For a \$5 donation, employees at area companies were able to dress down for the day. The funds raised enabled 30 children and staff to attend the Jewish Community Center Camp for 2 days.

**Labor** - United Way's Labor Participation Department worked in conjunction with the local labor movement on a number of programs, which provided a variety of support to our community. Some special community service projects that were conducted in cooperation with the Greater Wilkes-Barre Labor Council's Community Services Committee include: United Way/Labor Christmas Project, National Association of Letter Carriers Food Drive, Workers Memorial, and presentation of the George Meany Scouting Award. Monetary support came from numerous unions located throughout Wyoming Valley in the form of individual giving and special union treasury gifts. The Labor Leadership Giving Society completed its 12<sup>th</sup> year of operation. United Way's Labor Participation Committee played an active role in arranging a special campaign kick-off event and conducting agency tours throughout the year. Special volunteer support for the State Employee Combined Appeal Campaign was provided by AFSCME District Council 87 in providing a Loaned Labor Leader from AFSCME Local 2585, while PSSU Local 668 did the same. Labor's efforts were recognized locally by our United Way by presenting the United Way Labor Award to Patrick Connors, a member of Teamsters Local 401 and the Sarah & Anthony F. Kane, Jr. Achievement Award to Deborah Madrack of the Wyoming Area Education Association. Association. And finally, individuals who lost their jobs over the past year received special information through our Labor Participation Department's involvement with the state's Rapid Response Team. 450 dislocated workers from 4 different work sites learned about beneficial services that can assist them at various United Way agencies.

# **LOANED EXECUTIVE PROGRAM**

## **Loaned Executives and Loaned Labor Leaders**

***Each year, United Way of Wyoming Valley partners with organizations in the community to change lives!*** The *Loaned Executive Program* offers unique professional management training, development, and networking opportunities to individuals - recruited from or sponsored by organizations - student interns and work-study students from local colleges, and volunteers. These enthusiastic individuals play an integral role as account managers and are “loaned” to United Way of Wyoming Valley for 12 weeks, assisting in the Fall fundraising efforts on the public phase of the community-wide annual campaign. Following training, they work directly with United Way staff, volunteers, and workplace campaign coordinators to plan, organize, and implement workplace and mail fundraising campaigns within assigned organizations in local communities. The sectors include labor and industry, businesses small and large, education, government organizations, health care, non-profits, and professional firms. By thanking current contributors and encouraging others to consider donating to the United Way effort, they gain career-development skills through public speaking, event coordination, and networking opportunities. The *Program* includes information on United Way and its role as a fundraiser and community problem solver, its collaboration with community partners, agency tours, fundraising techniques, and the allocations process.

We would like to thank our six Loaned Executives and Loaned Labor Leaders and the sponsoring organizations in the effort to bring people and community resources together. Through their experience, exceptional teamwork and commitment to this important component of the campaign benefiting our community, they helped raise a tremendous amount of funds, allowing us to address the critical issues we face today in the human and social services needs within our community with the available resources.

By their involvement in the *Loaned Executive Program*, these talented individuals promoted their organizations through community relations, and experienced significant development opportunities, which may enhance current employment performance and lead to additional community volunteerism.

# Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins United Way Charity Fund



This past year, the Penguins and United Way teamed up to provide scholarships to 15 children so they they could partake in youth hockey. Funds were raised through a variety of special events and game promotions including: 50/50 Raffles, McCarthy Tire Tosses, and Game Worn Jersey Raffles. Since the fund's inception, more than \$260,000 has been given back to the community.
